- CSAM is a recording of them being raped and abused.
- Every time CSAM is viewed or shared – that victim is abused again.

Born: 1978

Died: 1984 in Holiday Inn Eindhoven

Cause of death: drug overdose during a recording of her being raped.

Last related report on sharing: 14th February 2023

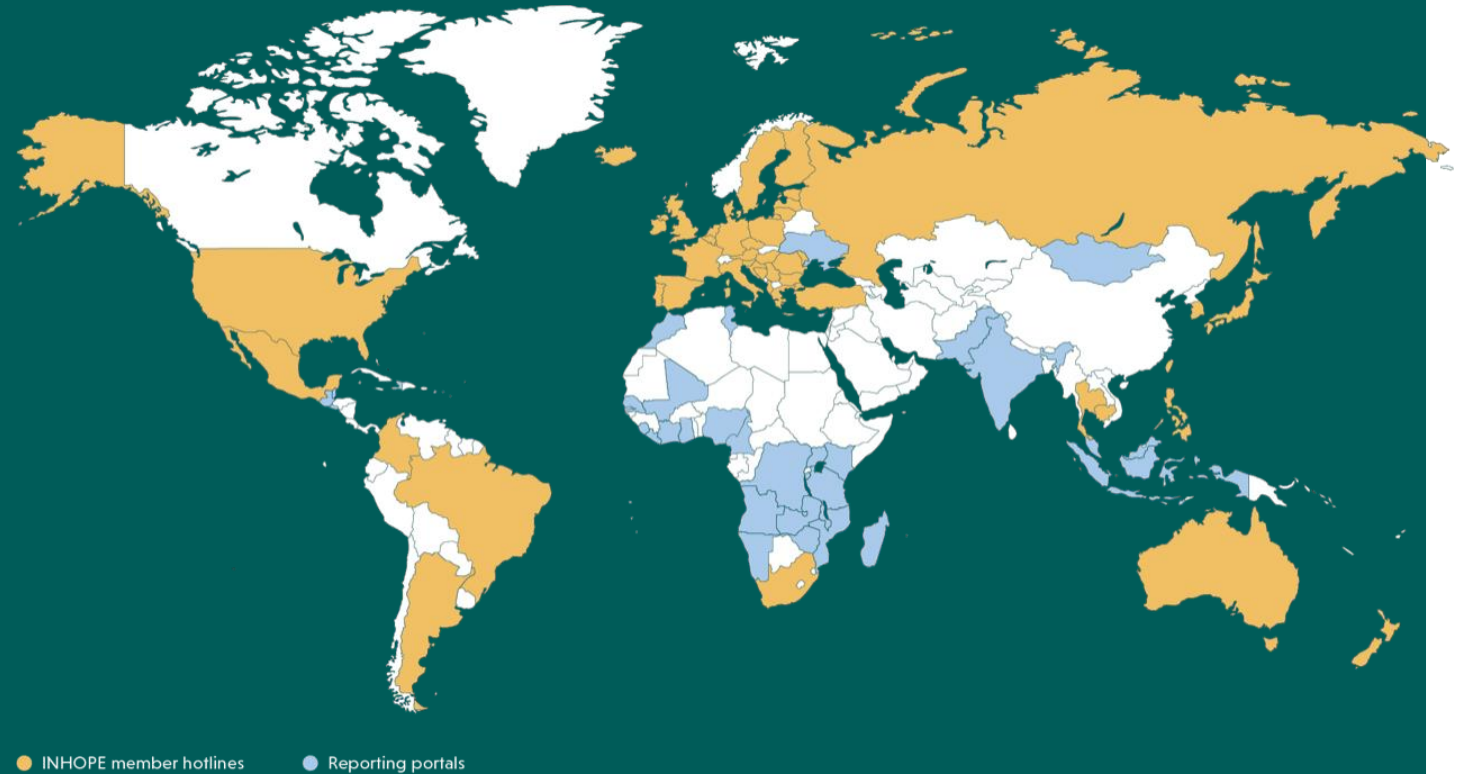
Why are you here?

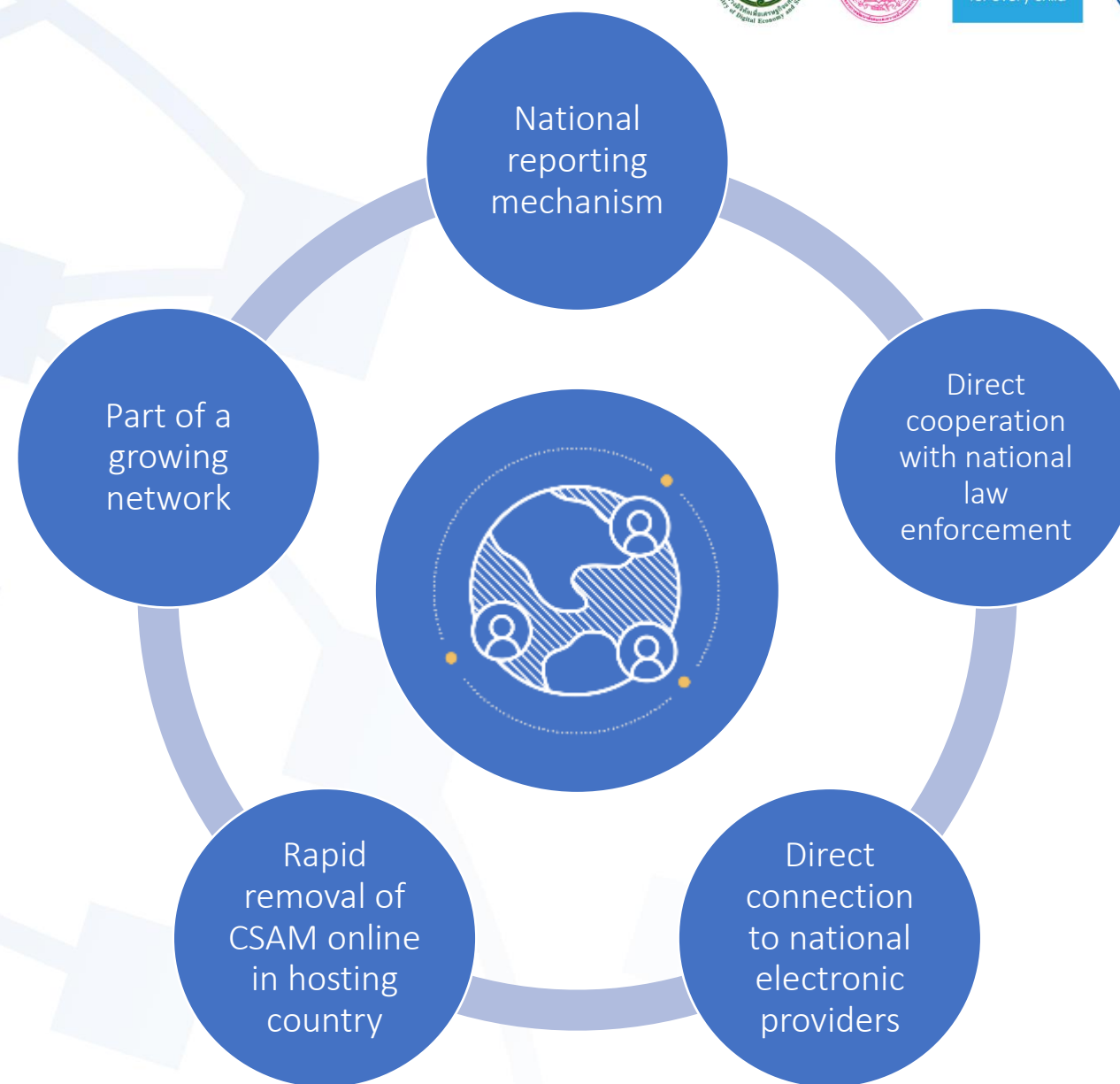


A Global Network



The role of our hotlines

A hotline enables the public to anonymously report online material they suspect may be illegal. A hotline analyst will investigate the report and, if confirmed illegal, they act to have the content removed from the internet as rapidly as possible.

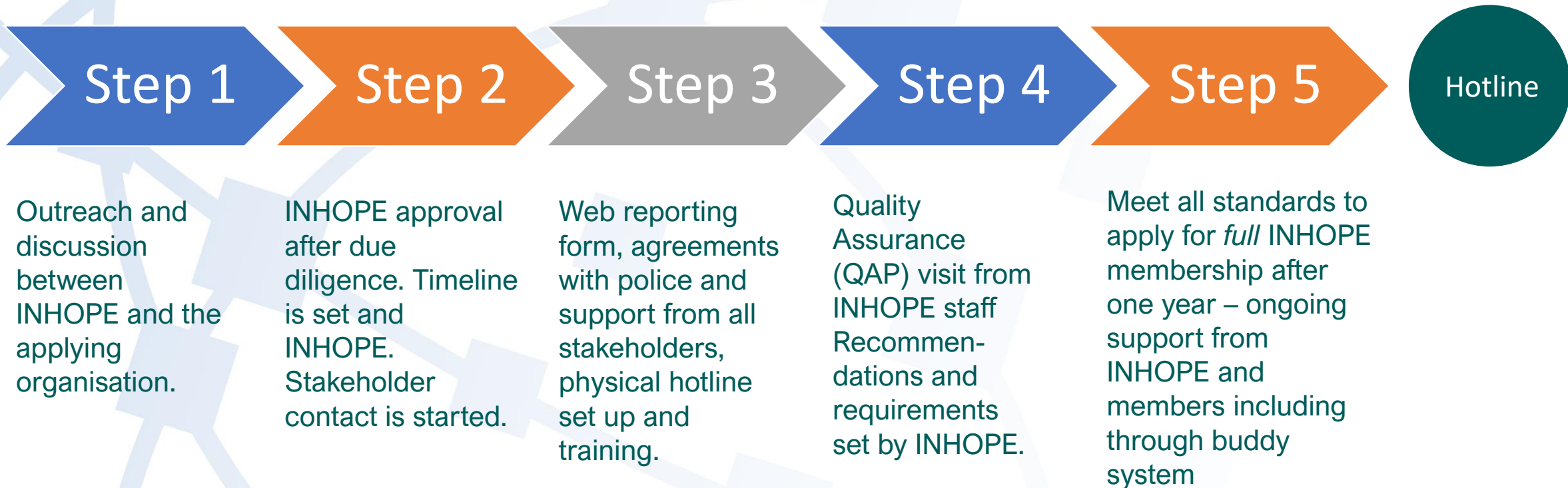

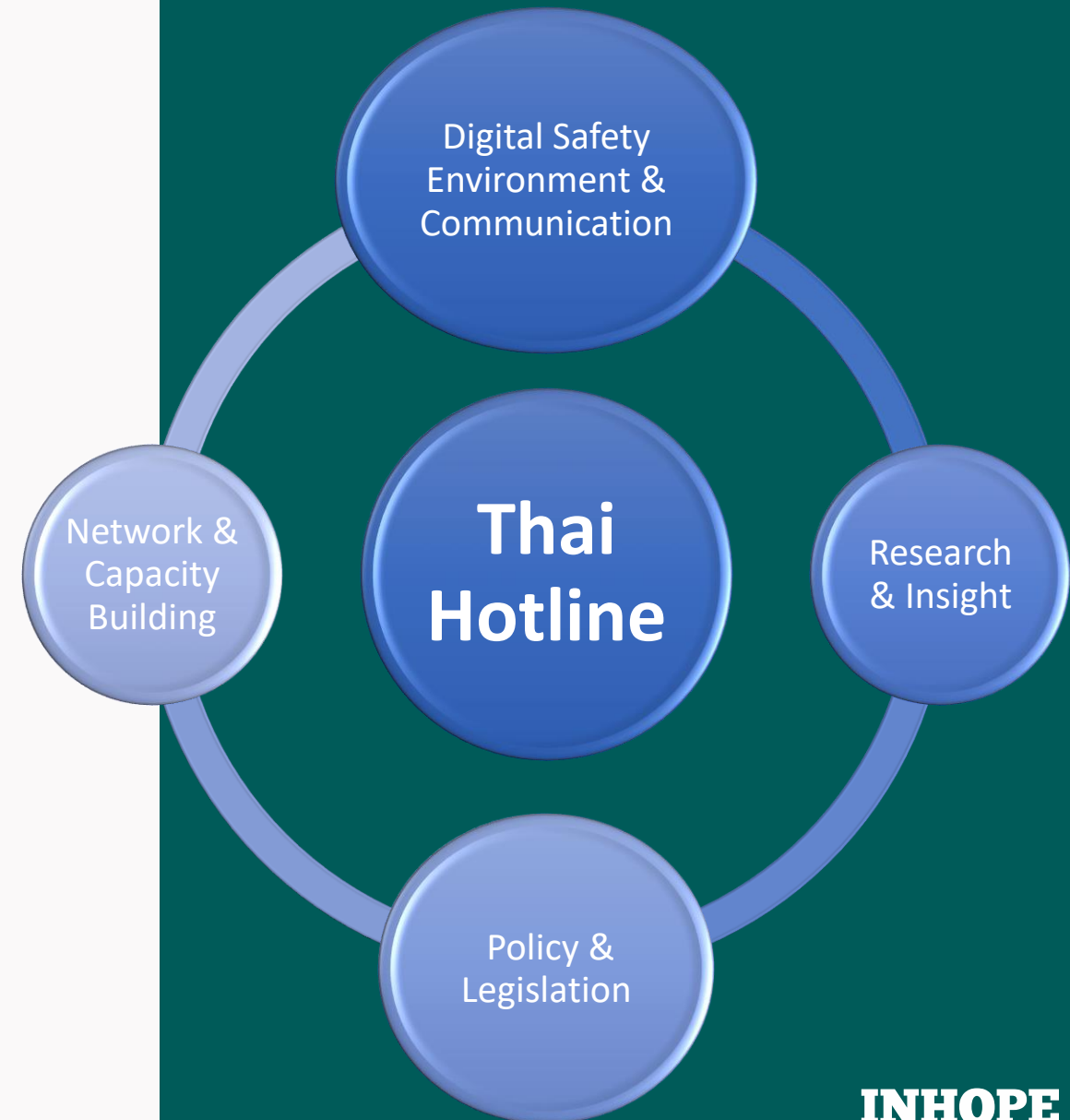

Thai Hotline

- Founded in April 2009
- Internet Foundation for the Development of Thailand established the Thai hotline and there is ongoing cooperation with the Thai ISP Association
- Creates a cyber-community-based monitoring mechanism to help report any illegal/harmful content making a safer online society
- Digital citizens are encouraged to report any illegal/harmful content to the ThaiHotline at www.thaihotline.org



Digital Safety Environment



- **Hotline Operation**
- ThaiHotline - Internet Hotline to report illegal or harmful content
- Ensure CSAM content is taken down

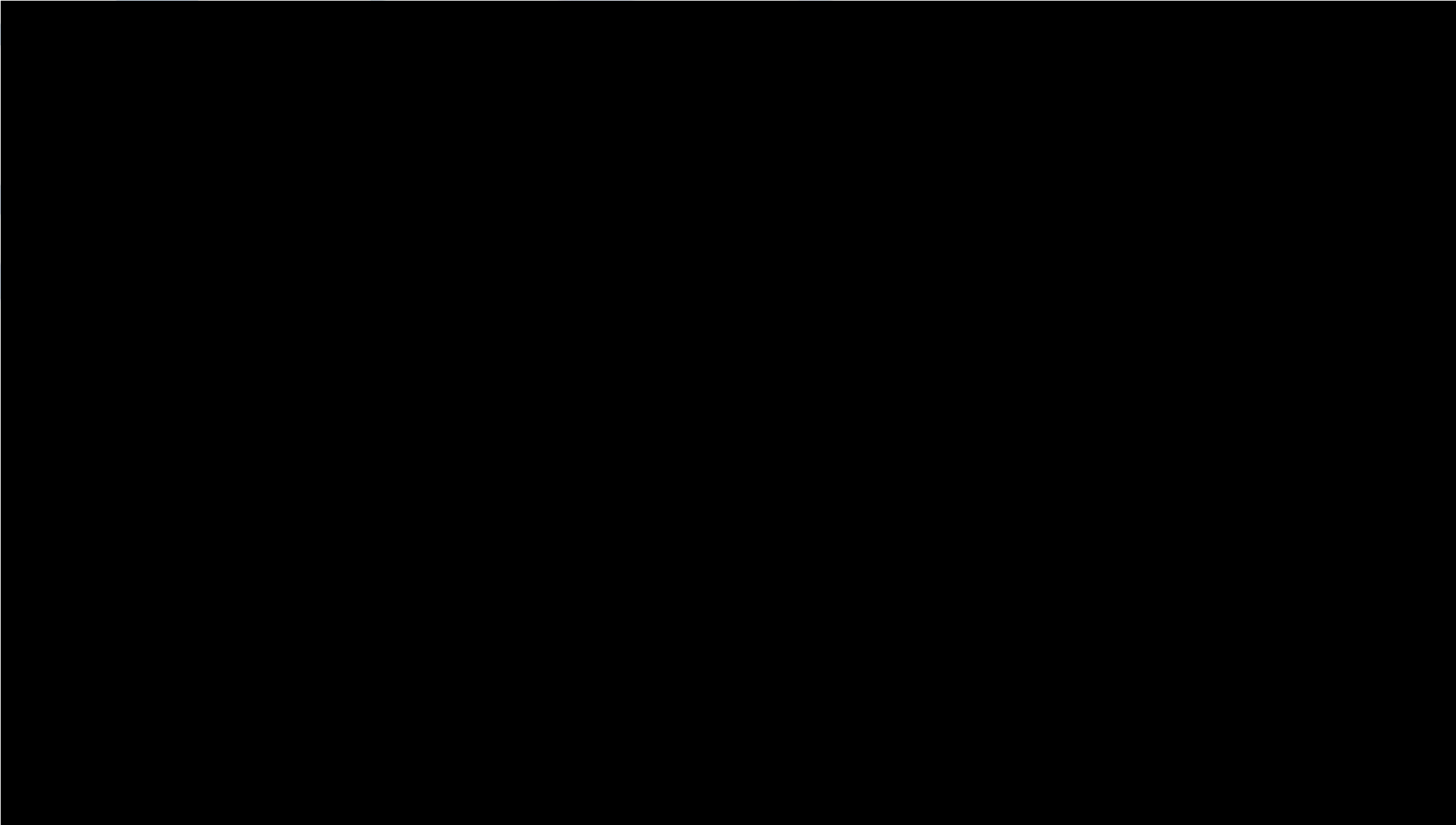

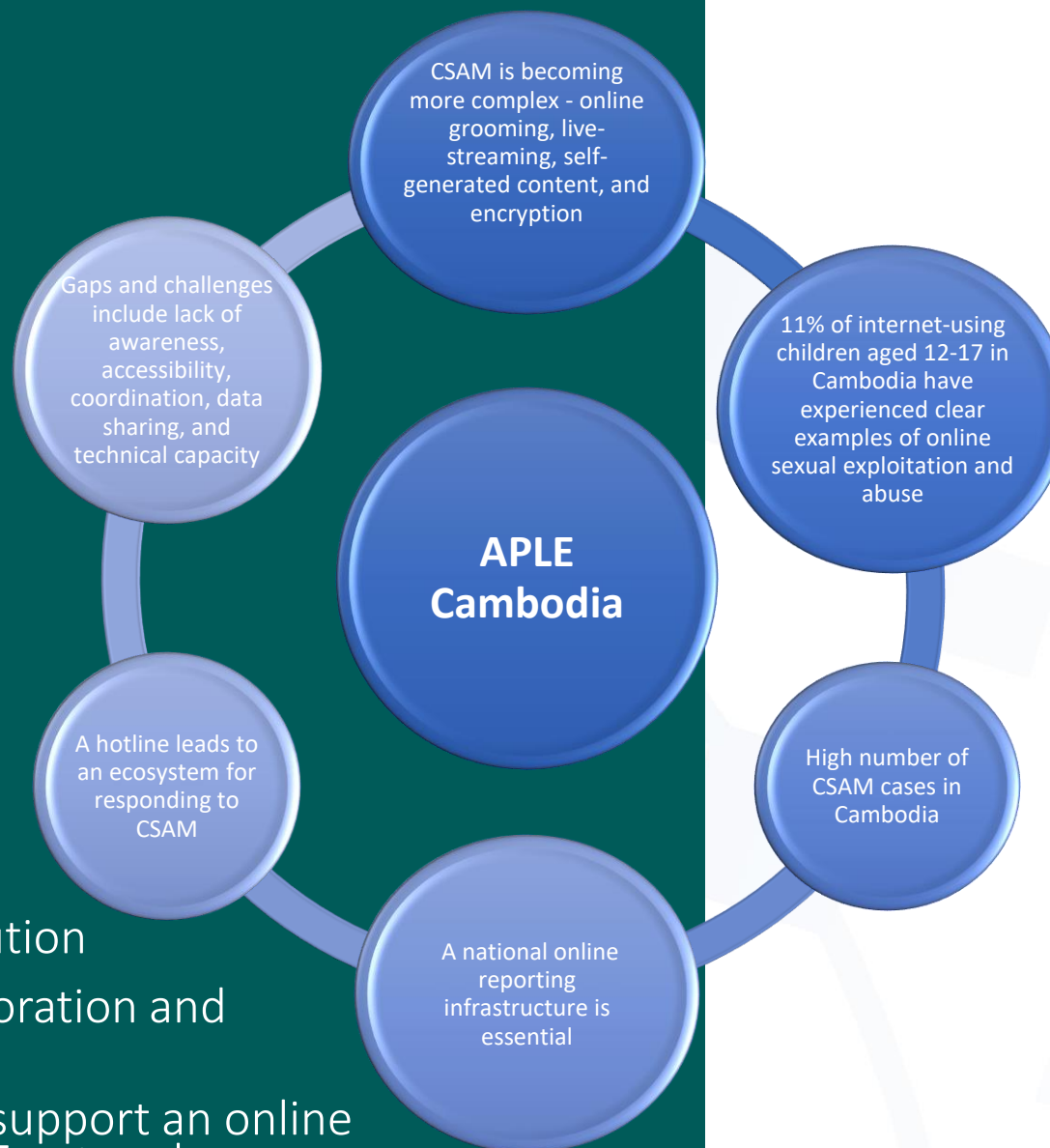


Recommendations
